### Welcome to St Mary's Kaikorai

Thank you for considering St Mary's Kaikorai for your child's education. If you have not already made contact with the school please phone us on 476-4277. We would love to have the opportunity to show you around the school and discuss your child's educational needs. You may prefer to bring your child during class time, to see how our programme functions. This would be welcomed by all staff.

Even though we are a catholic school there are opportunities for non-catholic students to be enrolled. All students need to be enrolled by our Parish Priest, Father Cipriano Fernandes, but this enrolment can be completed with the support of our Principal.

St Mary's Kaikorai is a Catholic Primary School catering for boys and girls from New Entrants to Year 6. The school is nestled privately on a well situated site with school grounds, spacious а newly orchard/garden developed and fully refurbished buildings in a city environment. A strong sense of family exists and children are encouraged to foster relationships across the school.



Both the Education Review Office (ERO) and the Catholic Education Office (CEO) have recognised the excellence in teaching and learning in the school.

"The special character of the school is strongly evident. Teachers actively promote the school's values of respect, honesty and helping. Students learn in a safe and caring environment. They are respectful of each other and of other adults in the school."

"Teachers use a range of assessment tools to effectively monitor and improve student achievement. ### **Settling Your Child Into School & Discovery Time Programme**

Six weeks before your child is due to start school the new entrant teacher will make contact with you about bringing your child along for 'school visits'. This will involve a weekly visit spread over six weeks prior to your child's starting date. You and your child are most welcome to come along to our school assemblies.

It is also a really good idea to bring your child to the playground at the weekends or afterschool so they get familiar with the surroundings of the school before their first visit.

### **Discovery Time Programme**

Studies have shown that children adapt more readily to school when they have been given the opportunity to integrate into classroom procedures gradually. We have a pre-school programme 'Discovery Time' on a Thursday to aid the transition of children from kindy to school. Please contact the school office for further information.

Children are invited to join the 'Discovery Time' programme as soon as they turn 4 along with a parent or caregiver.



Children will participate along with our new entrant class in the activities of alphabet formation, number work, music and movement, craft, physical education games, mimio active board experimentation and Discovery Time. These will help to develop listening skills, interaction with others, social skills, concentration and school routines resulting in settled, happy children.



### **Parent and Teachers Association**



### **Costs and School Uniform**

### How much are the school fees?

This varies a little from year to year. Stationery is approx. \$50 per student each year. Estimated activity fees \$30 per student each year and Donation \$20 per student or \$30 per family each year. The resources donations can be claimed back from the IRD as donations.

If your child decides to be part of a sports team, sports subs of between \$20 - \$60 (usually) need to be paid. This varies depending on the sport and how many are in each team.

During the year you may be asked to help with transport if you can or sometimes a small charge towards a trip is asked for if we are travelling by bus.

### How much are the attendance dues?

The Roman Catholic Diocese of Dunedin for attendance dues directly and are separate from the school fees. These are approximately \$100 per school term. These help to cover proprietor costs relating to land and buildings. If you are concerned with the dues we have discrete measures in place to greatly reduce these. Simply contact the principal for a confidential discussion.

### Uniform

Our uniform is the Catholic School uniform for the Dunedin area. We expect our full uniform to be worn to and from school each day. These can be purchased from The Warehouse or online at www.schooltex.co.nz. There are also some second hand uniforms in the school office for purchase. Please ensure all clothing is clearly named as it all looks alike.

### **Sports Uniforms**


St Mary's Kaikorai sports shirts and shorts are supplied by the school for a hire fee of \$5 for the year.

### **Our History**

Our church and school celebrated its centennial in 2012. In 1910 the Catholics of Kaikorai bought a section in Taieri Rd on which to build their Church and in June 1912 the foundation stone was laid by the then Bishop of Dunedin, Bishop Verdon. In a few short months the church was completed and opened on December 8<sup>th</sup> the same year. Unfortunately the Bishop was on a visit to the Hot Springs so the ceremony was performed by Rev Fr Coffey. For a number of years Father Coffey travelled from Rattray St. to St Mary's Kaikorai by horse and trap on a Sunday morning to say Mass. The entrance from Taieri Road was much wider in those days and Father was able to bring the horse and trap into the grounds and tie up the horse where the hall is now. Then Father became the proud owner of a Model T Ford which he used to drive into the church yard. However history relates he was not so happy when one morning he drove it over the bank, the same history does not say if anything apart from his pride was hurt.

In February of 1913 the Dominican Sisters came to teach school in the back half of the Church which was curtained off. There was a promised attendance of 40 children and 32 were listed as first day pupils ranging in age from 5 to 10 years.

A new departure was made in favour of the new suburban school. The Dominican Sisters, for the first time made use of Cable Cars from the Octagon up Stuart St, to the terminus at the Nairn St. cable sheds, which meant that the Sisters had to walk up Taieri Road in all weathers. As a result sometime the Sisters arrived badly weather beaten. However, there were many





'The school can claim sunshine, pure air and a beautiful view. The children too are affectionate and were never as happy as when performing some service for the Nuns, so that it is a pleasure to teach and train them. Every year many desirable pupils pass from St Mary's Kaikorai to Christian Brothers Secondary School St Dominic's. In both establishments the Kaikorai pupils take a good stand. Indeed some of the most successful pupils in the higher examinations come from the Kaikorai Hill."

In 1929 the lower school was blessed and opened by Bishop Whyte, and in 1953 Bishop Kavanagh opened the upper school. A third classroom and an administration block were added in 1980.

Molly Lane became the first lay Principal in 1978, and the last teaching sister left the School in 1979. Today the staff members are all lay teachers who aim to preserve its special character.

2003-2005 saw an extensive rebuilding programme. We now enjoy a new administration block, refitted classrooms, new resource areas library and toilet block. We continue to use the lower school hall for assemblies and other activities. The upgrades reflect the support and advice received from the Board of Trustees and the Diocese of Dunedin.

We are Catholic and Christian in our beliefs and faith. The Word of the God is central to our decision making and teaching practices.

Our beliefs are expressed as valuing uniqueness, developing an atmosphere of co-operation and respect, and the celebration of independent thinkers who make decisions about their learning.

We incorporate the values of respect, honesty and helping; and these are displayed in our classrooms.

The concept of dignity is something we also promote. We express the view that all people need to be treated with dignity regardless of their individualism.

The school has regular school masses and liturgies. Prayer begins and ends the day. Each class takes turns to lead assembly.

We support the Parish preparation for the sacraments of Reconciliation, Confirmation, and Eucharist.





### St Vincent de Paul

Seniors are also part of the St Vincent de Paul Youth Organisation and as such take part in a number of charity ventures, e.g visiting the elderly, helping them as required, and collecting for the needy.

We regularly visit the Little Sisters and share with them what we have been doing in school.



### **Discovery Time**

is a 60 minute programme that we have started in our Junior room once a week. It provides opportunities for the teacher to meet the diverse needs of students.

There is a focus for each day, which may target a specific area of the key competencies ie: managing self, relating to others, participating and contributing, thinking, using test and symbols.

The students choose any of these activities during that 60 minutes. An essential part of Discovery Time is reflecting on their learning, which is done after each session.

  - Building skills while constructing


